- * Within one working day you will receive confirmation that your email has been received and has been referred to the most appropriate person (e.g. Year Adviser, Classroom Teacher, Head Teacher etc.)
- * Your query will be acknowledged by the person it has been forwarded to within three working days.

 - If the matter is urgent, please contact the school on 9999 4035.

School Uniform

All parents have been emailed in the last week regarding our efforts to maintain high standards with regards to our school uniform. Thank you to all parents who support the school in ensuring their child is in uniform. A large proportion of students wear perfect uniform every day and it doesn't go unnoticed.

Mobile Phones

From Day 1 Term 4 2023, in all NSW Public Schools, there has been no capacity for mobile phone use in school for all students in Years 7-12 This includes all school organised events including camps, carnivals and excursions. It also covers canteen use. Students will need to ensure they have a card or use flexi-schools. We understand that students carry their phone with them to and from school. Phones will need to be turned off and in bags when students arrive at school and should not be accessed until they leave the school grounds at the end of the day. We thank parents for their support and request that should they need to message their child, they call the school, and the message will be delivered. Students who have had to hand their phone into the office can collect it at the end of the school day at 2.30pm (including Wednesday) for their first infringement. We will be promoting the *Phones off and Away All Day* policy through social media.

E-Bikes

Correspondence was sent to all parents on Friday 1 March in regard to E-bikes. Every day we receive numerous complaints from members of the public who are feeling increasingly unsafe on the footpath outside the school. We are also receiving reports from members of the community about unsafe and poor behaviour shown by students in the Pittwater High School uniform. We are requesting the ongoing support of parents to reinforce messages of safety to their children who own an E-bike. Students are not permitted to ride bikes on school grounds – this includes entry points to the school. All students riding bikes to school are to WALK their bike through Gate 4 (the Hall Car Park gate) and leave their bike along the front fence of the school. No bikes are to be left against buildings. Students must wear a helmet at all times.

Teachers' Professional Learning – HSC Improvement

The Growth Project – Note Making at Pittwater High School

As a member of our school community, we hope you are familiar with the aim that we aspire for growth for every student and one of our specific school improvement goals is to improve this growth over the two-year HSC. All teachers at Pittwater HS are engaging in Professional Learning to improve. I wanted to share a little bit about how that is looking in a daily classroom experience.


In education, it has been widely recognised for many years that simply copying notes requires a very low level of engagement on the behalf of a student and is a task devoid of integrity and rich curious thinking. All our staff have been developing ways to get curious about what kind of notes engender deeper thinking and demand high levels of engagement to allow students to reach higher order thinking, more of the time.

In Standard English, a few classes have now experimented with a new note-making strategy specifically designed to increase their conceptual thinking in place of lower order tasks. For the study of a short story in The Language, Identity and Culture Module, students were given an A3 sheet with 8 hand-written and teacher selected quotations. The students then followed an Inquiry Model to add to the notes, clarify words and draw connections and conclusion prompted by the note-making layout. The students immediately warmed to the new note-making structure as the thinking was structured yet also posed a problem to solve, what were the deeper concepts at play? The other huge benefit was the time saved in analysing the story. We ensured that we covered all important elements and techniques, but we still had 30 minutes of the lesson to explicitly share and build further on our findings reaching to sophisticated thinking that everyone in the class contributed to. Each student left with a visual study guide and some rich conceptual findings to transfer to their next analytical paragraph.



Note Making continued

Please see our examples below, I hope that these are now pinned up on study spaces ready to be revisited in the trials and final exams where students will be eternally grateful to their Term 2 selves for putting in the work.



Our teachers will be continuing the conversation about how note-making can challenge more rigorous thinking from their subject's perspective and exploring how the notes made can be transferred into writing that communicates increasingly sophisticated ideas.





NSW School Vaccination Program 2024 Pittwater High School

Dear parents/carers,

If your child is in **Year 7** or **Year 10** you can provide **online consent** for their **routine school vaccinations.**

- •Year 10: Meningococcal ACWY, school clinic, 26 March 2024
- •Year 7: Diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) school clinic, 4 June 2024

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) school clinic, 18th June 2024

Vaccinations will only be provided at school if proper consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- 1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school and login using your ServiceNSW details.
 - This is the same account you may already use to renew your Driver's Licence.
 - Refer to <u>Service NSW</u> to create an account if you don't already have one.
- 2. **Update or confirm** your personal details in Service NSW as required.
- 3. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child.

Read a step-by-step guide on how to provide consent online. Translated guides are available in Arabic, Korean, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, Vietnamese.

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card or access, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school.

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR)
