Last week I had the pleasure of attending Bilgola Plateau Public School where the 13 Peninsula Community of Schools officially received sporting equipment from the 'Coles Sports for Schools vouchers' program. But the equipment is not staying in the peninsular – rather the three pallets of sporting equipment is being donated to 13 sister schools in the Katherine area of Arnhem Land. Cathy Freeman and Preston Campbell attended the assembly with the PCS Principals and student leaders, recognising the contribution made by the students and families of the PCS in supporting indigenous education and sport. In attendance from Pittwater High were Luke B senior prefect sport, and Nyree Clark senior prefect social justice. Cathy and Preston took the time to chat to students and were genuinely impressed by the efforts of our schools.

This initiative builds on other work the PCS has carried out in supporting the Katherine Group of Schools through Ian



Thorpe's charity Fountain of Youth. Collaborative fundraising across the Peninsula Community of Schools has provided literacy backpacks for indigenous students in the Northern Territory. As a result of the foundations work, these schools now have Smart boards to enhance student engagement and learning, libraries with quality reading materials, PM home readers and of course the literacy backpacks. We are proud of our involvement in supporting these disadvantaged schools and plan to continue these links.

for the future will have forgotten me.

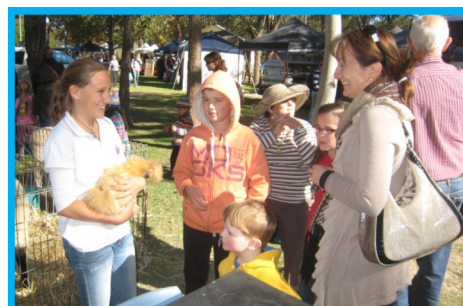
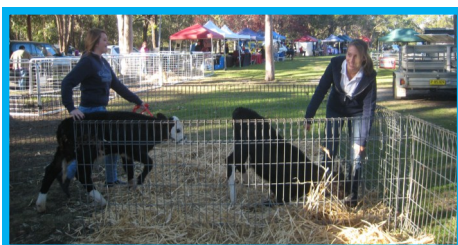
ST IVES SHOW — 18 AND 19 MAY 2013

DUKE OF EDINBURGH

The Dukes of Hazard

After 48 hours worth of blood, sweat and tears, the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh crew arrived home. There were cuts, bruises and sore legs all round but a feeling of accomplishment that came with completing the hike.

The Duke of Edinburgh was founded in 1956 by His Royal Highness, Prince Phillip and has had over seven million participants from 130 different countries. Pittwater High School is lucky enough to be one of the many schools able to participate in this scheme that promotes a well-rounded life.

In order for the “Dukes”, as they call themselves, to be able to complete their Bronze Award, they must do over 15 hours of community service, six months of a physical activity, six months of a skill and the ever exhausting hikes.

On the weekend’s hike, the Dukes were accompanied by a teacher and an older student mentor within their walking groups. This however, will not be the case for the test hike that is scheduled for early next term. The students, in groups of six or seven, will be completely left to their own devices with only a map, compass and emergency walkie-talkie to find their way through the national park. Some will find this daunting while in others it will bring out their natural navigation skills.

Although the teachers spent the majority of the first term assuring the Dukes that nothing would go wrong on the hike, it did. Nearly four groups got lost between the last 5-6 kilometres from the campsite, an event that lead them to be wandering around aimlessly at 8 o’clock at night. The simple instruction of sticking to the ridgeline for the rest of the off-track walk was foolishly ignored, leading to an extra four hours of stress for the said groups. As the night got darker and the three groups, who did make it back to camp, became worried, Mr Tucker went bravely out to find the lost groups. When Mr Tucker finally brought the lost groups through the gate into camp hours later, there were many tears and many hugs. In an amazing show of teamwork, everyone helped one another set up their tents and food in a matter of minutes.

Duke of Edinburgh is not just to test your orienteering skills. It brings friends closer together through the exhausting hardship of having to climb seemingly endless hills and cliffs. People who appear to be annoying and immature in school are almost a whole different person on the hike. With a group that isn’t constantly going into meltdown and arguing with one another, the hike is more of a bonding experience than a laborious trek.

Supply Means Supply' WIN one of two Apple iPads

"Secondary Supply" is the provision of alcohol in a private home to young people aged under 18 years, usually by an adult, sibling etc. Secondary Supply is the main way young people under 18 years obtain alcohol. Almost 40% of under-age drinkers get alcohol from their parents and only 5% buy it themselves. (Australian Drug Foundation, May 2012)

The Northern Beaches Community Drug Action Team (CDAT) together with NSW Police, Manly Drug Education and Counselling Centre (MDECC), Northern Sydney Local Health District and local Councils are working together to implement the Supply Means Supply campaign.

The first step of the campaign is to survey parents/carers living on the northern beaches about their attitudes and behaviours relating to secondary supply.

The survey will help CDAT to ascertain the social norms and pressures placed on this group.

Step two is to work with the survey results to tailor an appropriate awareness raising campaign and design parent/carer workshops to meet their needs in gaining better communication skills, legislation, and to identify the harms and risks associated to underage drinking and binge drinking in young people.

The workshops will allow parents/carers to link into further support programs should they need ongoing support.
