



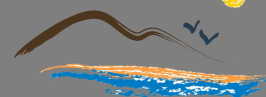

Principal's Report: Jane Ferris

At Pittwater High School we are now positioned to launch the BYOD program that will allow students to bring their own technology device to school. To this end we are having an information evening for all parents on Wednesday 28 May. Even though tablets and the like are now more affordable, it is important that parents purchase a device with the correct specifications so that it can link into the school's wireless network and meet the students' learning needs. In addition, from 6pm we will be distributing to parents an access code that will enable them to log into the Parent Portal. This access will give parents the opportunity to track their own student's attendance period by period as well as in the future look up the latest school report and so on. Please see the flyer reissued in this newsletter - a repeat of the one emailed out to parents last week.

Student Leadership

Student leadership is alive and well at Pittwater High School. This Friday will see the induction of over 50 newly selected Student Representative Council students in years 7 to 10. These enthusiastic students have already had a planning day to map out their ideas for 2014. I look forward to meeting with many parents in attendance at this special ceremony. Also coming up shortly is the beginning of the selection process for prefects and captains from the year 11 student body. Students interested in nominating need to attend a leadership morning on Tuesday 27 May before school in the library. The prefect body at PHS serve from the beginning of semester 2 for 4 terms so that by the time term 3 in the HSC year comes around they can fully concentrate on their studies.

Class Visits

I welcome the opportunity to visit students in their classes. Recently I had the privilege of visiting the accelerated year 10 and two year 11 Hospitality classes to view their amazing cupcakes and lamingtons in our Trade Training Centre. The brief was not just to make scrumptious cakes, but also to come up with a great design. The skill, techniques, variety and creativity on display was amazing. Also I was invited to join a school based Aboriginal Dance excursion with the year 8 dance class and accelerated year 9 stage 6 Aboriginal Studies students. The presenter certainly had the students enchanted with the dances and all the knowledge and experience he was happy to share.

Year 10 into 11 subject selection information evening

On Tuesday 3 June at 6pm there is an important subject selection information evening for year 10 students and parents. Not only will the subject selection process and patterns of study for the HSC be explained, but also head teachers and staff will be on hand to answer any questions about their subjects. In the days immediately following this evening, students and parents will be invited to interviews to discuss best options for their subject choices.

Pittwater High School offers a great program of study and support in the senior school with an outstanding track record of HSC results. In the senior school there is a very positive culture of working hard and achieving one's best, forged on the continuity that a 7 - 12 high school offers. Last year we had a large intake into year 11 from the private sector. 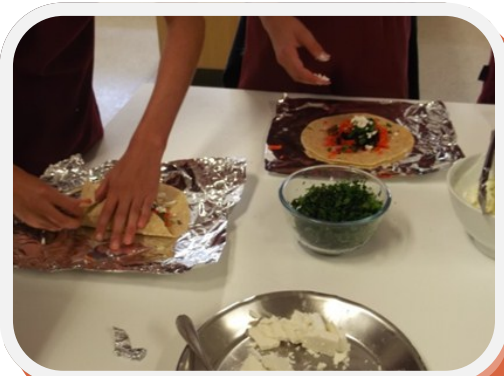

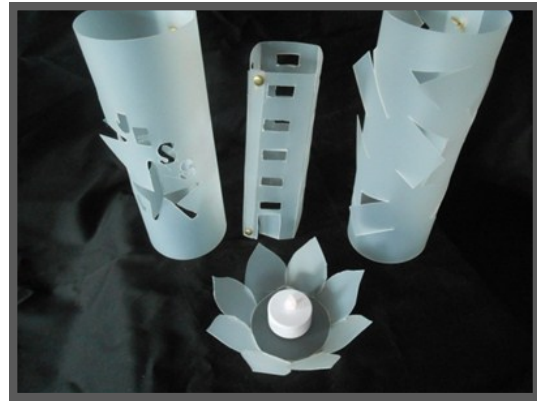


YEAR 7 TECHNOLOGY

Unit Design and Illuminate

In this unit students researched an Australian designer of their choice. The task required them to look at how they became a designer, their inspirations and to come up with a design that would suit the designers range of products. Students learnt new skills in word processing and presentation to create their assignment

In the Illuminate design project year 7 students have been learning to use the Adobe Illustrate program to create a design for a polypropylene light shade. Prototypes were created using paper first and a final design was chosen. These designs were then used with the new laser cutter to create their light shade. We have some spectacular results from both laser cut and hand cut designs

YEAR 8 TECHNOLOGY: EVENT MANAGEMENT

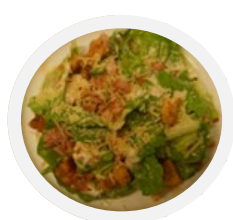
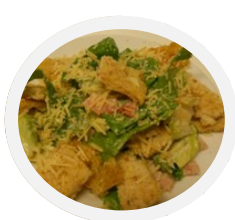
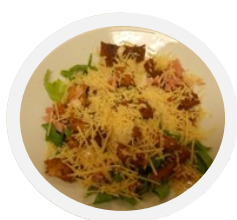

Jayden – Turned floor lamp

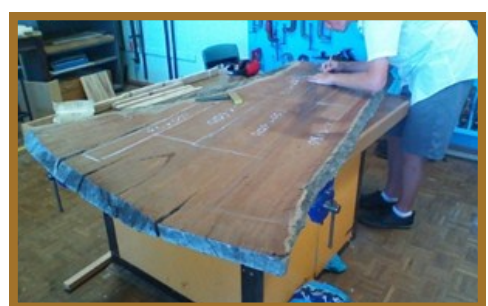
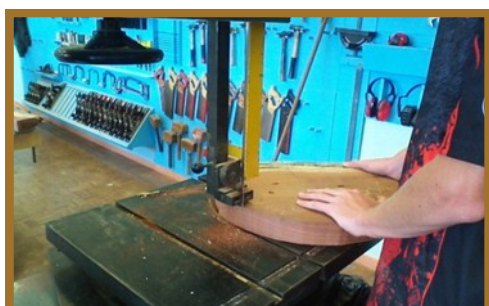
JJ – Knock down kitchen storage unit

YEAR 7 MODEL MAKING

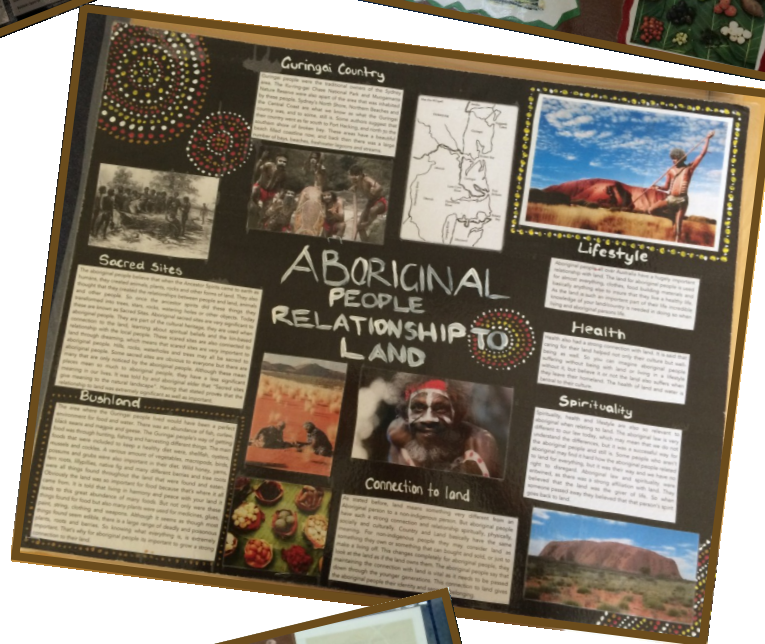

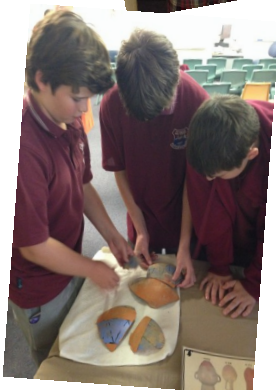
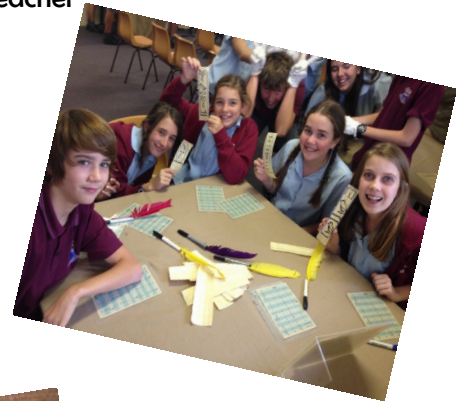
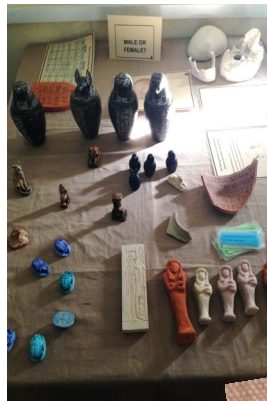
Dr Eve Guerry – DR EGYPT

Dr Eve Guerry came to Pittwater High School on Friday 9 May and gave the Senior Ancient History and the Year 7 History classes an experience of being an Egyptologist. She talked to the students about her personal experience excavating tombs in the Valley of the Kings near Thebes and gave the students hands on experience with artefacts. The seniors learnt about Dr Guerry's experience on the archaeological dig and were able to be involved in hands on activities involving artefacts. She educated the senior students on how to write a well-informed essay on ancient Egypt and gave them practical experience with interpreting artefacts uncovered from a tomb in the Valley of the Kings.

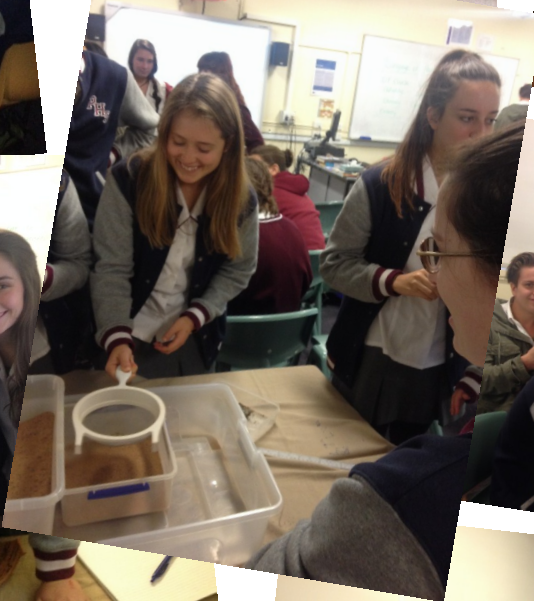
The junior students were led on a journey about the process of excavating in Ancient Egypt. They sifted for objects and then had to find and classify artefacts and decipher hieroglyphs to uncover information about the site. The junior students also reconstructed a replica of a pot found at the site.

The senior students gained an invaluable insight into how to craft a spectacular essay and how to analyse and interpret sources. The junior students thoroughly enjoyed their sessions with many students planning a career in archaeology. The school was buzzing with everyone jealous of the senior Ancient History students and Year Seven having such a wonderful and unique experience. Other Year 7 History classes will work with Dr Guerry in August.

ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATION

This year's commemoration focused on the contribution of Indigenous Australians to war since 1914. The ceremony was conducted by our School Captains, Ainslee and Ryan. The welcome to country was presented by Year 9 Aboriginal Studies student, Alana Reneman, who spoke from her personal experience.

Ryan explained the Anzac Legend and Ainslee discussed the reasons for indigenous enlistment in wars from 1914. Prefects presented speeches and read recited poems during the ceremony. Mungo discussed the experience of Aboriginal soldiers in the armed forces and Tim Kovaks presented a biographical account of two Aboriginal soldiers, focusing on their lives during and after World War 2. Katie recited "The Coloured Digger" which was written by Sapper Bert Beros in 1942 and Alessandro recited "The Ode".

Music enhanced the commemoration and thanks go to Dr Hardy and Miss Meyers for their organisation and preparation of the students. For the first time at a Pittwater Anzac Day commemoration the choir performed "Abide by Me" and led the school in singing the National Anthem. The band accompanied the choir and also played "Waltzing Matilda". Sharon Nobbs of Year Seven did an outstanding job playing "The Last Post" and "Reveille".

Pittwater students always display a high standard of behaviour and respect at the Anzac Day commemoration and the event showcases the strength of the prefect body and the professionalism and talent of our music students.

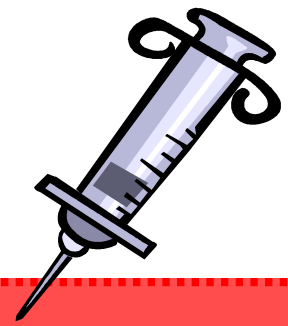
