Principal's Report: Jane Ferris

This year some of our teachers have elected to work on projects in leading educational innovation (LEiP). Teachers worked over three terms to plan, implement, reflect and present their findings. The quality of innovation was evident when the participating teachers presented their LEiP projects last week. Projects included investigation into scientific report writing, observing and reporting on learning capabilities, critical reflection in increasing resilience and performance, literacy app in year 7 TAS, project based learning, alternative pathways for seniors and stress management support in the classroom. Through LEiP, learning opportunities for students have been enhanced while our teachers are clearly life long learners adding to the positive culture of our school community.

Senior Support Study Day

Last Thursday our 2016 year 12 students participated in a senior study day. In the morning they attended workshops on memory techniques and studying smart, time management and organisational skills, understanding new technologies and their applications, and effectively working with BYOD. Learning to use different software, including OneNote, Excel and the Adobe suite, as well as a greater familiarity with the flexibility of Microsoft 365 and Google Apps will not only assist students as they prepare for the HSC but also move into work or tertiary study. Students are also able to easily search for and access current relevant information and share learning using cloud based applications. In the afternoon students attended a 3 hour workshop on the English area of study Discovery presented by Karen Yager. In all students commented a very worthwhile day. Thank you to staff who gave up their time running workshops.

High School Experience Days

On Monday and Tuesday we hosted year 5 students from Newport Public School and Mona Vale Public School to a taster of high school. Students participated in a range of lessons such as science, history, wood technology, visual arts, drama, gym and agriculture giving them the opportunity to be taught by specialist teachers in specialist rooms. This was a wonderful opportunity to assist them early on in their orientation towards high school for 2016. The visiting primary school teachers were very impressed at the calibre of teachers, the maturity and helpfulness of the year 9 helpers and how welcome they were all made to feel. At the conclusion of the day the students were treated to a concert featuring our talented musicians and dancers. The hard work and commitment by our staff is greatly appreciated and we thank all involved.



Important dates for this cohort group are the Open Nights at their local Peninsular of Schools high school in term one next year - Barrenjoey HS Thursday 26 February; Pittwater HS Tuesday 1 March; Narrabeen Sport HS Wednesday 2 March. All our schools offer high quality education and are proudly public schools. 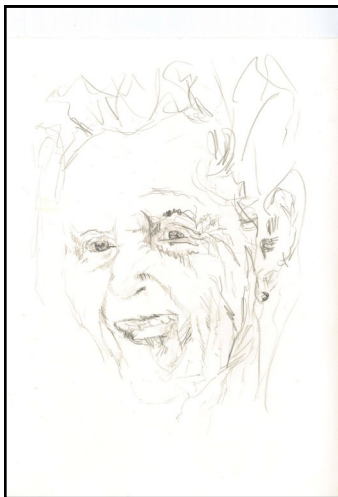

Race Rules and Further Information

1. Entries accepted on the morning but if you wish to have breakfast please inform the Monday before race day. This enables us to cater. If you enter on race day you will not be able to attend breakfast. Breakfast starts at 8am at the Trade Training Centre (behind the school hall).
2. You may compete as an individual and complete both swim and run. You may also compete as a team "tagging" your runner as you leave the water. A swimmer may tag more than one runner.
3. Race starts 6:45am.
4. At no stage is running on the road permitted. Crossing roads is to be done under supervision of Race Officials. Undue delays at crossings may be subject to time adjustment. Failure to comply with direction at crossing will lead to instant disqualification and disciplinary action at school.
5. Traffic has priority over competitors.
6. There are to be no "unofficial entries". Participants from other schools and parents are most welcome to compete. (An official entry consists of this sheet with appropriate declaration completed.)
7. Race officials will determine your race category. Certificates and medals will be awarded as soon as practicable.
8. Adequate race preparation must be undertaken in the weeks proceeding the race. Trial swims and runs of similar distances must be undertaken. Firstly for confidence, then building carefully over several sessions, gradually increasing to "race pace".
9. Any competitor with a medical condition which may influence their performance must make officials alert to details, so additional monitoring and care can be provided.

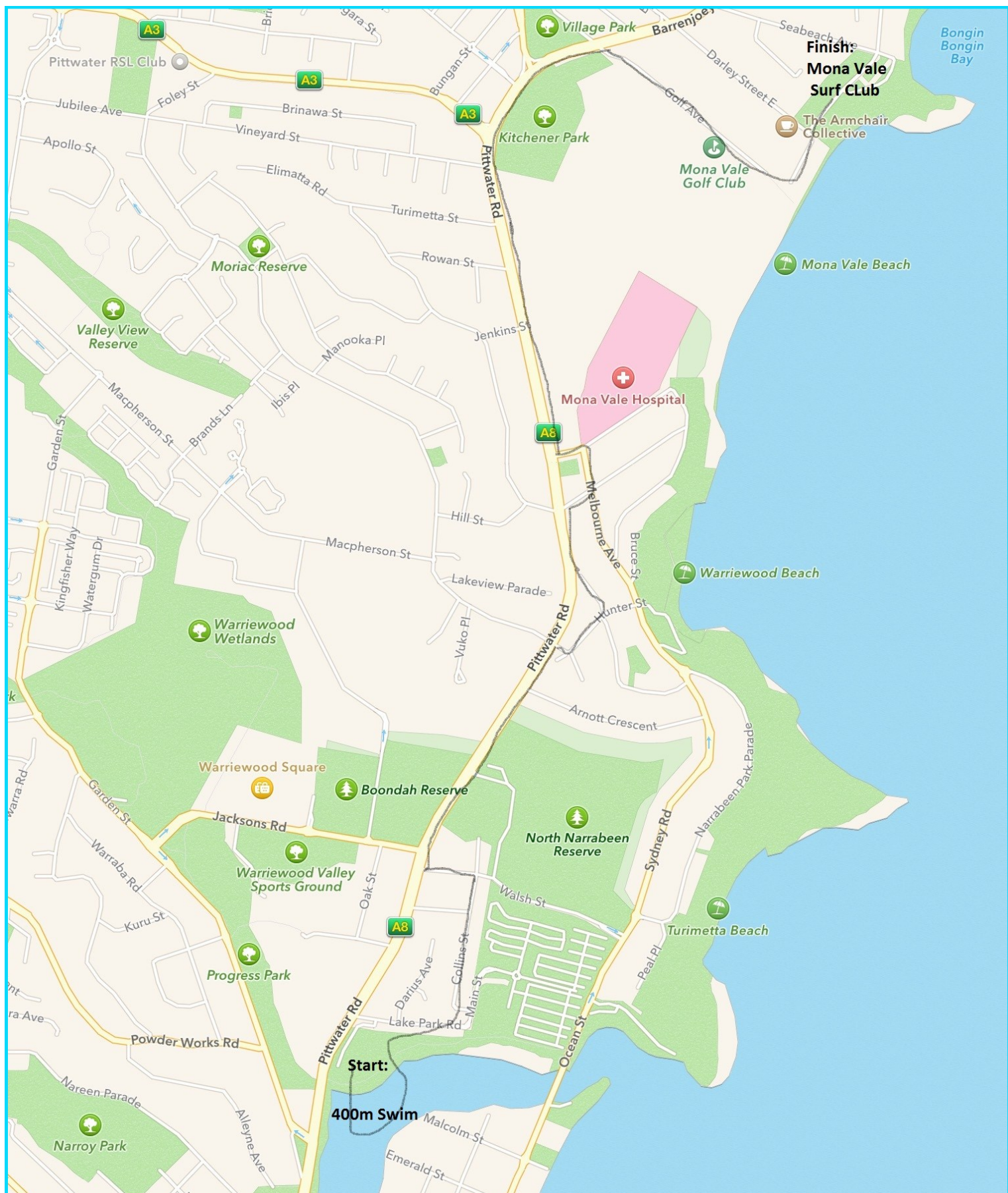

The Pittwater High School continues to stamp its authority as a powerhouse of schoolboy rugby union on the Northern Beaches. The under 16's boys Peninsula Cup Rugby Union tournament concluded last term with PHS prevailing victorious as the cup winners against some high fancied rugby institutions found north of the bridge (Spit Bridge).

Now as we were approaching the pointy end of the competition, we were only placed 3rd on the ladder after suffering a couple of losses in the round robin competition due to injuries and players being absent from school. However, we knew as a team, deep down that come the finals campaign the team would lift! Because mate ship would be found in bucket loads! Talent was seen exponentially across the park! INFORMATION REGARDING INTRODUCTION OF SCHOOL OPAL CARD

FAO: School Principal

Dear Sir/Madam,

Changes to SSTS applications and the introduction of the School Opal card.

The School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) gives eligible students free or subsidised travel between home and school, on the approved train, bus or ferry services.

From term one 2016, Transport for NSW will be issuing School Opal cards to students eligible for travel under the School Student Transport Scheme via a new online application process.

The introduction of the new School Opal card and online application form will provide significant benefits for schools:

Automatic renewal

Most parents, guardians and students won't need to apply for a School Opal card if they have already been given a school student travel pass and will automatically receive a School Opal card in 2016.

However, parents, guardians and students will need to apply if the student:

- is just starting school and has not had a pass before
- is in a transition year (i.e., year 2 to 3, or 6 to 7)
- is changing schools, including going between primary and secondary school
- or, if the student's personal details have changed (e.g. address).

Reduced distribution

While School Opal cards will automatically sent to schools for existing pass holders for distribution for travel in term one, all new applications received for travel from the start of 2016 will be sent directly to the student's nominated address.

Online application form

Schools will no longer need to keep the SSTS application form as parents, guardians and students can go online from 2 November 2015 to complete their application form, print it out and return it to the school.

Fewer forms

Schools will only need to endorse a single application form for each student's eligible address and send it to a single address (Locked Bag 5085, Parramatta 2124) even if they are applying for multiple services.

Simplified replacement process

Schools won't need to endorse additional applications for lost, stolen or damaged passes, as parents, guardians and students simply need to visit www.transportnsw.info/school-students or call 131 500 to order a

new School Opal card. Schools can continue to follow their current processes for students who have lost their pass.

Online eligibility assessment

The new online application portal will automatically assess eligibility based on distance rules.

Same eligibility rules

The eligibility rules for subsidised school travel remain the same for travel inside and outside the Opal network. Students may need to live a minimum distance away their school:

- Years K-2 (Infants) there's no minimum distance.
- Years 3-6 (Primary) 1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking distance or further.
- Years 7-12 (Secondary) 2.0km straight line distance or 2.9km walking distance or further.

How you can help?

- Display the enclosed poster on the school noticeboard.
- Distribute the flyers to students and parents.
- Encourage applicants to go online to apply for 2016 travel in the Opal network via your communication channels. The application is available at transportnsw.info/school-students. Paper forms that have already been completed and submitted to Transport for NSW or a transport operator will be processed and do not need to be resubmitted.
- Responsibly dispose of any remaining blue SSTS application forms.
- Add digital tiles and banners to add to your website when they arrive via email.

Fact sheet: The School Opal card

Who's eligible?

To be eligible for a School Opal card, students need to be NSW residents and may need to live a minimum distance away from their school:

- Years K-2 (Infants) there's no minimum distance.
- Years 3-6 (Primary) 1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking or further.
- Years 7-12 (Secondary) 2.0km straight line distance or 2.9km walking or further.

Students completing secondary studies at TAFE, boarding school students and students temporarily in Australia may also be eligible for a School Opal card. The eligibility criteria for these students is available at transportnsw.info/school-students.

A School Opal card is provided to eligible students who need to travel within the Opal network. Paper travel passes are issued to eligible students who need to travel outside the Opal network.

Who needs to apply?

Most students or parents won't need to apply for the School Opal card. The School Opal card will be sent to a student's school automatically at the beginning of the new school year in 2016.

However, a new application is required if:

- The student is just starting school or has not had a pass for travel before.
- The student is progressing from Year 2 to 3, or Year 6 to 7.
- The student is changing schools, including going between primary and secondary school.
- The student's personal details have changed (e.g. address).

Applications must be made by a parent or guardian for children aged 15 years and under. Applications must be made by the student if aged 16 years or older.

How to apply

Step 1 Complete the application at transportnsw.info/school-students.

Step 2 Print, sign and submit the form to the school for endorsement.

Step 3 The school will then forward the application to Transport for NSW for processing. Once approved, Transport for NSW sends the School Opal card to the home address given in the application.

The application may take several weeks and the applicant's email address is required.

If the student doesn't qualify for free travel

They may be eligible for a Term Bus Pass which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.
