Year 10 – Civics and Citizenship Test

Thank you to the randomly selected sample of students in Year 10 that participated in the national Civics and Citizenship Test last week.

Students embraced the opportunity to share their knowledge and understanding, attitudes, beliefs and skills associated with the capacity to function as active and informed citizens. A public report on the results of the assessment achievement in relation to the defined national proficiency levels will be released in 2017 however no individual student or school result will be published.




Textiles and Design News

Mathematics Competition 2016

The International Competition and Assessment for Schools (ICAS) was held on the 16th of August this year. A record number of students, 225 in all, from Pittwater High School participated in this competition. The students ranged from Year 7 to Year 12.

This competition assesses student skills and knowledge across five strands.

- Algebra and Patterns
- Chance and Data
- Measurement and Units
- Number and Arithmetic
- Space and Geometry.

The competition was held in the school under normal examination conditions, giving the students experience in exam techniques. The exam aims to identify the full range of mathematical skills by starting with simple questions and building towards the final questions that are very demanding.

The students' achievements were rewarded with certificates of Credit and Distinction. To achieve a Distinction, a result in the top 10% of the entrants is required across the entire group of participants.

Pittwater High School has achieved great results with 32 Distinctions (14% of candidature) and 94 credits

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Yr 7 STEM Project

The NSW Board of Studies ('Bostes') writes ...

"Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics are identified as essential areas of study for Australia to maintain a high quality of life. Future prosperity depends on students studying in and across these areas in order to foster scientific and technological developments."

"STEM, drawn from the four disciplines of Science (**S**), Technology (**T**), Engineering (**E**), and Mathematics (**M**) recognises the importance of this integration and its significance for Australia's competitive future. These four disciplines are also referred to as the 'Pillars of STEM'."

So, to achieve these aims, our current Year 7 Extension class has embarked on a STEM project of their own. A double period per cycle – one period each from Maths and Science – has been reallocated to the project, which has been supervised by Meg Winter from the Science Faculty and myself. The students worked collaboratively, in pairs, in our new Learning Space.

Their brief was to produce a video game ... but not just any game! It had to reflect their interest in an issue of their choice related to environmental sustainability. The project involved a coding 'language' called "Scratch" which enabled the students to manipulate their characters through a series of ordered movements and commands.

Before creating their game, students were first introduced to the central STEM concepts involved in the project. These included investigations into just some of the many ways in which humans have impacted on the environment. They also looked into the role of the engineer, with a particular focus on software engineering. Having decided on their own topic, they created an 'Infographic' (which looked *WAY* better than the "old school" poster projects I used to make!!) enabled by the templates available on the *Piktochart* website.

Once they had understood the possibilities offered by the Scratch software, students were able to create a storyboard outlining each sequence in their game and the actual game developed from there.

The project is conducted over the entire second semester, so development continues.

"STEM day at Macquarie"

n Monday 17th October, 20 year 10 Maths students visited both Cochlear Australia and Macquarie University. The excursion was to show real life applications of maths and science outside of school classes. This allowed students to meet engineers and university students who are studying degrees in medical science and actuary.

Cochlear Australia specialises in Cochlear Implants. Cochlear supplies these implants to people globally and improves the hearing of many different people with varying hearing loss. The students were given a tour of the largest clean room in the southern hemisphere where the implants are made and were shown where the implants are tested. The sound booth tests the effectiveness of the implants by immersing the person in sound then instructing them to only repeat the voice heard from one speaker that is talking to you while there are varying levels of background sound, this allows the engineers to test their products on recipients. Cochlear Australia has had a significant impact on how hearing implants are used and made and the importance of what the employees do every day can be shown in this implant activation video where Jonathan is hearing his mother's voice for the first time. <u>https://</u> <u>www.youtube.com/watch?v=ZDD7Ohs5tAk</u>.

Year 10 were also taken on a tour at Macquare University. We were shown around campus and given examples of degrees which required science and maths as well as the ways in which you can get into university.

Overall the excursion was interesting and will assist us in our maths studies in the future.


