#### **CELEBRATING EXCELLENCE and BUILDING RESILIENCE**

Congratulations to all our students who received awards on Presentation Evening this week. I would also like to acknowledge that there are many other students that have done really well in achieving their personal best who didn't receive an award as time and space on the evening does not permit. However many of these students have been recognised at Sport presentations, instrumental music presentations, year meetings and other assemblies.



In my address I indicated that the key to success at school both academically and developing as a complete whole well adjusted person, is resilience. Sadly in our society with increased expectations of what we should have, what we should do, how we should look and how we should perform, we often lack resilience and become anxious. Recent research by Resilient Youth Australia has found that 25% of girls and 21% of boys feel anxious and under strain. These levels shoot up to 69% of girls and 36% of boys by year 12.

This clearly is counter productive as ensuing poor sleep, lack of concentration, procrastination and memory difficulties hinder the capacity to continue to excel not

to mention a lessening of the joy of learning. How we support development of resilience in the school is central.

At the school we have a very proactive wellbeing program to assist students in their development as well as PDHPE addressing issues such as mental health through the teaching programs. Most important we focus on the skills of critical and creative thinking, collaboration, independent learning and developing an inquisitive mind. This focus, rather on simply content, helps develop resilience.

Most important is also developing a sense of connection and belonging within the school community. With students feeling safe and happy, they can have the confidence in their learning to have a go without fear of putdowns. Our students in the main are very respectful of each other and learn how to self reflect and provide constructive feedback to their peers.

Persistence is also key to resilience and therefore success in learning. Our guest speaker James Spithill did not get to be a champion sailor without hours and hours of training and pacing himself. This is indeed a lesson students can apply as they take ownership of their learning.

So to all students – congratulations if you know you have done your best this year. Seek out the opportunities within our school to develop all your skills, sense of worth and hopefully a life long love of learning.

## BYOD A Year 10 Perspective

n Term 3, the Year 10 Math classes were given a project that entailed budgeting for our future lives. We had to choose a career and research the income and necessary qualifications. We also had to research the costs of renting/buying a house, insurance, having a car, bills and the cost of going to university. We collated all this information and created a budget using an Excel spread sheet. When using Excel, we learned how to use formulas that automatically calculate values and enabled us to conduct "what-if" analyses to see how results change, when individual or combinations of input values change, without re-entering the whole spread sheet.

We gained crucial knowledge in how to purchase a house, manage mortgage payments, also factoring in the general cost of living and university debt. In this project, we learned about how finance is such a significant part of living independently.

This project was very enjoyable and informative because the knowledge we gained will be very helpful in planning our future life. In Year 10 Maths, we learn about linear and non-linear relationships, trigonometry and circle geometry, amongst other things. Some of us have been left wondering if any of it will have any use in our future, whereas, in this assignment, we used financial maths which is very useful knowledge for all of us after school.

This week, Pittwater High School unveils its "Gateways to Learning" mural on the brick wall of C block in the school quadrangle. Enthusiastically supported by our principal, Ms Ferris, The Mural Project was supervised by Mrs Jamieson and local artist Cam Wall and was intended to extend students with an interest in art, and encourage older students to mentor younger students over two terms. As well as learning how to design an artwork, transfer a design and execute it, the students practised school's key values of Respect, Responsibility and Aspire through working cooperatively and displaying commitment and focus to the project. The overarching design

of the artwork itself is based on the Fibonacci sequence, a Mathematical progression, and incorporates design elements which represent Art, Music, Science, HSIE, TAS, Maths and English. It is symbolic of Pittwater's commitment to cross curricular projects which extend and engage students, and to engendering a love of lifelong learning in our students.


