Principal's Report - Jane Ferris

On the recent band tour to China, I had the privilege of being one of the accompanying teachers. Never have I been more proud of our amazing students. They reflected so much of what we value as a school and would wish of all our students as they develop into young adults:

Talent – it is wonderful to see such high standards in the orchestra, stage band and symphonic band. But talent is nurtured and developed, as reflected in the years these students have invested in learning their instruments and the months of additional rehearsals before going on tour.

Persistence – the students had the benefit of a master class on tour where being good wasn't good enough. The students accepted the challenge as they persisted in playing the same bars again and again until excellence was achieved.

Cooperation and teamwork – a great mark of a successful band is how members are tuned into each other and follow the conductor to produce cohesive tuneful music. This cooperation went beyond playing, and was evident on the whole tour as students looked out for each other and cooperated with lugging some of the bigger gear. The students on my bus and in my group were absolutely awesome.



Caring – when there were a few moments of homesickness, tummy upsets, mislaid phones or a broken wrist, the students were so caring, thoughtful and kind. With my own unscheduled surgery in Beijing students concern and good wishes was certainly the silver lining. Thank you especially to my 'slaves' who pushed me around Tiananmen Square and the Forbidden City in a wheel chair so I did not have to miss out!

Inquisitive – it is great when students respond to a different culture with wonderment, awe and respect. Our students made the most of all the opportunities in China.

Friendly and outgoing – despite language barriers, on school visits the interaction between our students and their Chinese hosts was fantastic. This happened when waiting for concerts to start, in the dining hall, multiple selfies with our students (who almost had movie star status!) or the impromptu competitive basketball games.

Thank you to parents that supported their child going to China and entrusted them to our care. Thank you to all the parents that got behind the fund raising with a special thank you to Katrina Mellon. A huge thank you to Kiri Fleming, who not only was a chaperone on tour, but also a huge driver in the organisation of the tour. Thank you to Joanna Cartwright who joined the tour as a chaperone, being a qualified nurse tending to all our health needs. Thank you to fellow teachers on tour, Fiona Gudmunson and Mark Chaffer. Thank you to our new symphonic band director Joshua Hughes for your enthusiasm and support. A HUGE thank you to our Head Teacher CAPA and Director of the Instrumental Program at Pittwater High School – your ongoing commitment and dedication as demonstrated in making this tour happen (including countless paper work!) is so greatly appreciated by all. And finally, thank you to all the amazing students on band tour who ultimately made it so successful. It has been a joy getting to know you all.

A reminder of our school expectations

The following items are not permitted at school: any **illicit materials (this includes on BYOD devices), laser lights, high energy drinks, permanent markers, skateboards, aerosol sprays, chewing gum, and liquid whiteout.**

There are often council rangers patrolling the area so please be aware of these restrictions.



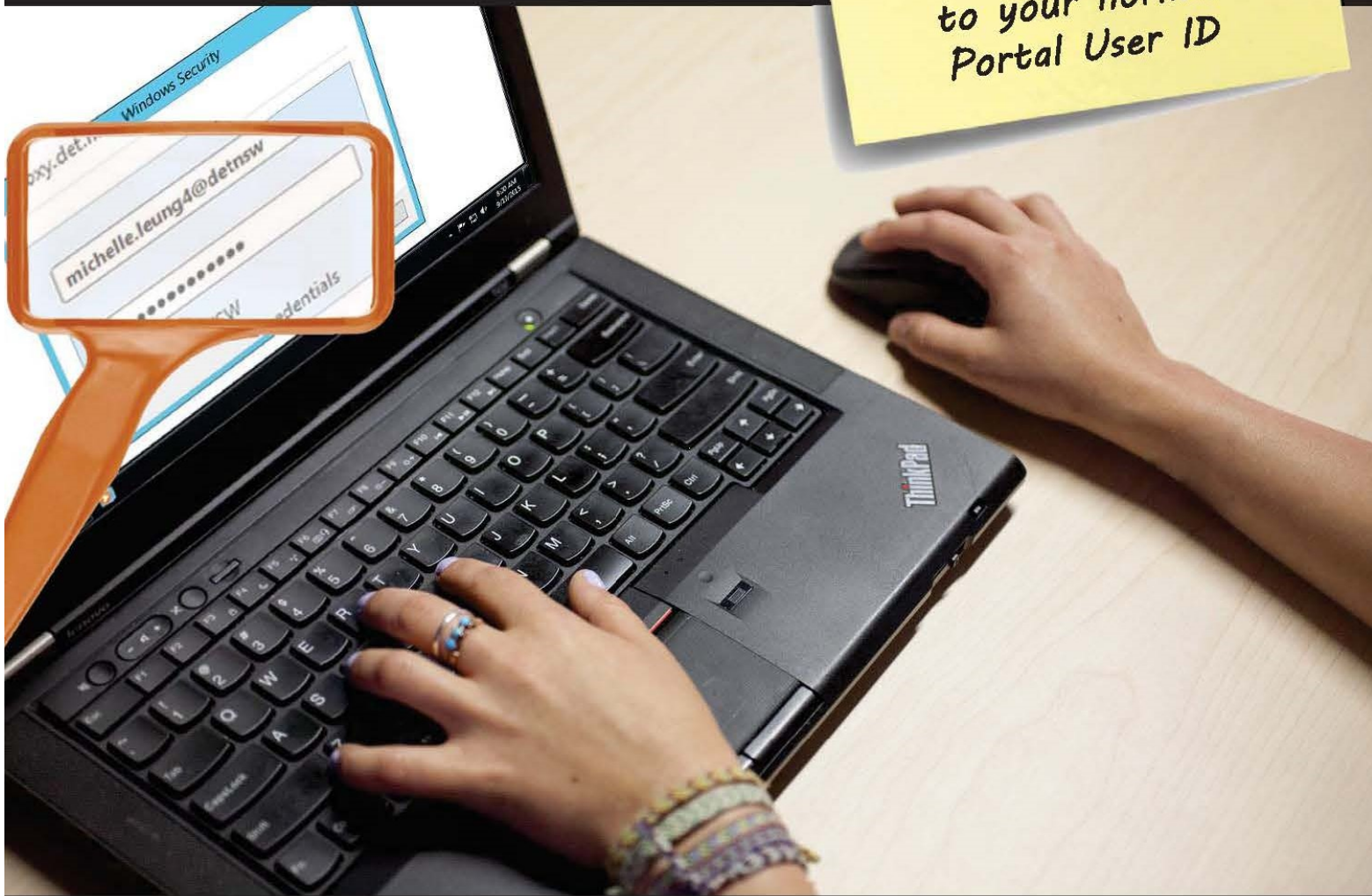

BYOD

From **Thursday 26th May** you have to change the Wi-Fi settings on your BYO device to be able to connect to the internet

IMPORTANT CHANGE:
When signing on to access an Internet website, you'll need to add @detnsw to your normal Portal User ID



From 26th of May, use the **new settings** posters that are in every classroom and outside the BYOD Office to configure your device.

When accessing the internet and prompted for your credentials, remember to add **@detnsw** to your User ID

BYOD

BYOD or Bring Your Own Device is a policy implemented by the NSW Department of Education and Communities where the students are encouraged to use their own digital devices in the classroom. Pittwater High School will facilitate the students who bring their own device by giving them access to the school network.

The main advantage of BYOD is once the students' devices are connected to the network; a student can begin creating and self-teaching. Students will gain the ability to access any information that they require for their learning task.



Teachers will incorporate BYOD in the classroom by setting tasks that are digitally based. For example, these tasks may require students to create e-portfolios, which can incorporate research, idea development, imagery, audio and video. Such tasks are comprised of stimulating and exciting methods of learning that appeal to the next generation's learning style.



Pittwater High School will support students without a device by offering them a school laptop which they can loan for a nominal fee, which upon completion of their studies Pittwater high school will refund their fee in full.

Google over the years, have really pushed for a free office suite. With Google docs, Google spreadsheet, Google form, Google presentation and Google draw. With these free applications, students can create documents and save it all on their Google drive. Students can also submit their work to the teacher via Google drive. The Google system is a web-based application, so can work across all platforms with options for downloadable variants.

THE ENGLISH FACULTY

In the past few years the Board of Studies has introduced the English 7-10 National Curriculum and changed the prescriptions list of texts for study in 11-12. This has required great change in the delivery and programming of English.

We took this opportunity to rewrite all our junior programs focussing on the conceptual aspects of our curriculum. Students are now engaged in "Big Question" studies that drive their learning. This approach allows teachers to incorporate a broader range of texts and students to deeply engage in and personally reflect on their learning.

In Term 1 students focused on:

Year 7: Identity: How do the ways we perceive ourselves, others and the world influence the meaning of texts?

Year 8: Appreciation: How do texts reflect the values and perspectives of the composer and responder?

Year 9: Persuasion and Positioning: How do composers use words and language to influence and persuade others to make change?

Year 10: Crafting: How do authors craft their work to inspire, challenge and entertain an audience?

In Term 2 teachers and students are looking forward to investigating:

Year 7: Appreciation: How do authors create realistic characters and explore important ideas by harnessing the power of words?

Year 8: Stagecraft: How are ideas conveyed and audiences impacted through elements of Stagecraft?

Year 9: Appreciation: How can we appreciate the influence that novels have on the way we view ourselves and the world around us?

Year 10: Contexts and Paradigms: How does Shakespeare transcend context and continue to connect with audiences regardless of time, culture or creed?

Assessment is ongoing through these units with all across year summative assessment tasks and supporting resources on Year group EDMODO sites. We encourage you to talk to your children about their investigations into their questions and share opinions and ideas. We look forward to a great year of exploration and learning.

INDUSTRIAL TECHNOLOGY MULTIMEDIA



In the Industrial Technology Multimedia classroom the student will encounter many projects where they are encouraged to think laterally and conceptually. Students of Multimedia are encouraged to brainstorm ideas and engage in collaborative thinking and discussion with their peers and encouraging one another to come up with a solution for any given tasks or assessments. Students are free to create enchanting and whimsical tasks that broaden their creativity to projects with no limitations.

Senior Multimedia This year heralded a change in multimedia at Pittwater High School with the introduction of its first senior multimedia class. The newly formed senior multimedia classes will embark on new and exciting levels of learning, with an approach to creative and innovative design solutions through investigating and implementing emerging technologies within the industry.

Senior major projects can be focused on many types of multimedia ranging from 3D and 2D game development, 3D and 2D animations, short films with VFX.

Students are encouraged to investigate and develop their senior major projects for themselves. The teacher guides them and gives them the necessary skills to ensure their success in multimedia, but will not encroach on their freedom to create what they really want.

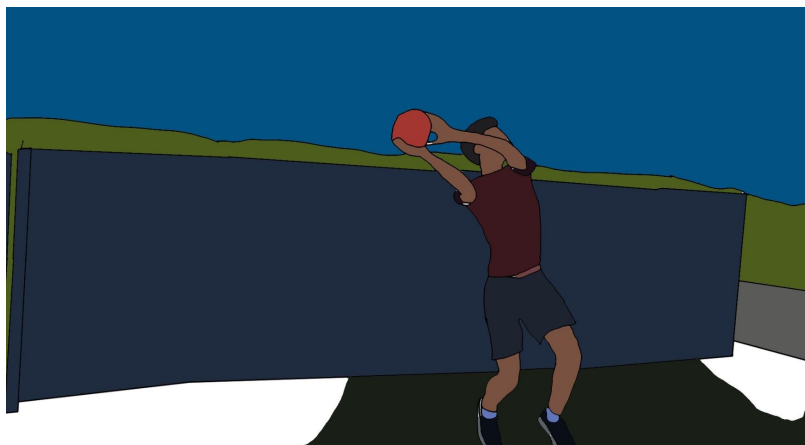

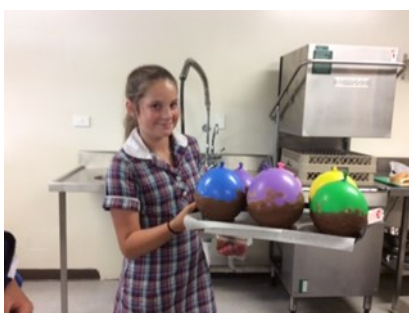

TECHNOLOGY (Mandatory)



8 Tec2, 8-4, 8-5 and 8-7 recently completed the Café For A Day unit. Students worked in small groups to complete the design project that requires them to create a two course meal suitable for a café. This required them to consider what makes a successful café, understand the limitations involved in the project, research ideas and themes and negotiate with the group members to create their café. Many weeks of planning goes into the café that runs for two periods, where they style their café with menus and table settings and present their meals to another group. The collaboration in planning and running the cafe help to develop negotiation skills amongst group members and dealing with customers. Each student creates an individual digital portfolio that documents the design process. The unit finishes with an evaluation and written review of the café in a newspaper format.



YEAR 12 HOSPITALITY

Year 12 and the accelerated year 11 Hospitality classes have been very creative of late. One of their assessment tasks was to develop a new restaurant (in theory) and then to create a signature dish to showcase the restaurant's ethos and style of food. The classes worked in small teams to produce four identical servings of the one dish to exemplify what it would be like in Industry to keep consistency and accuracy in their servings.

To further develop their skills, many of the students have been working hard to cater for some of the school functions during the year. From open night to school athletics carnivals, the students have been preparing large quantities of food to gain an understanding of food preparation and service for events and large scale functions. This will assist those students who are looking to complete their Certificate II in Hospitality Kitchen Operations.

WHAT IS IMPORTANCE OF TECHNOLOGY SUBJECTS IN SECONDARY SCHOOL



After students have studied a mandatory course "Technology" in years 7 and 8 they can elect to study a range of subjects that are categorised in the Technology learning area.

In short; the technology subjects are about providing opportunities for students to develop their capabilities by combining designing and making skills with knowledge and understanding in order to make quality and functional products.

As there is a current skills shortage in the creative, manufacturing and engineering industries we aim to plan and program technology subjects that are inspiring, rigorous and practical in order to prepare our students to live and work in the designed and manmade world. Technology subjects bring learning to life. Students get to make decisions for themselves, be creative, innovative and explore design through practical authentic learning activities.

Skills learned in technology help with learning across the curriculum. For example knowledge learnt about the properties of materials helps in science, and the practice of measuring helps in mathematics. In addition; the 21st century capabilities of communication, collaboration, creative and critical thinking, and resilience are a vital component of the technology subjects which provide a firm basis for lifelong learning. Most importantly students are being prepared and well-equipped for their future endeavours.

YEAR 11 CONSTRUCTION CONCRETING PROJECT

This year the year 11 construction class will be building a new shed to be used as a storage facility for the VET Construction at PHS. The students formed up and poured a slab of concrete measuring 7 x 4.2m in the last week of Term 1.

The construction students learnt how to erect formwork, screed and level roadbase, lay plastic, install reinforcing mesh and pour the concrete. During the pour students had to evenly spread the concrete and then screed it. Once the concrete began to cure the students had to bull float the surface and then apply a coving finish with the coving trowels.

We look forward to constructing the shed later this term.

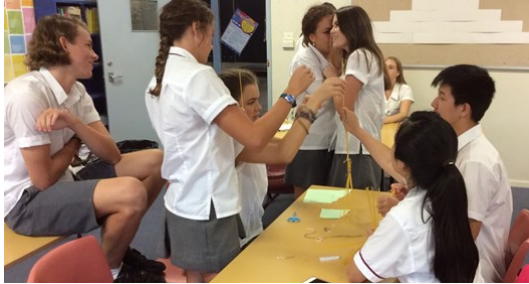

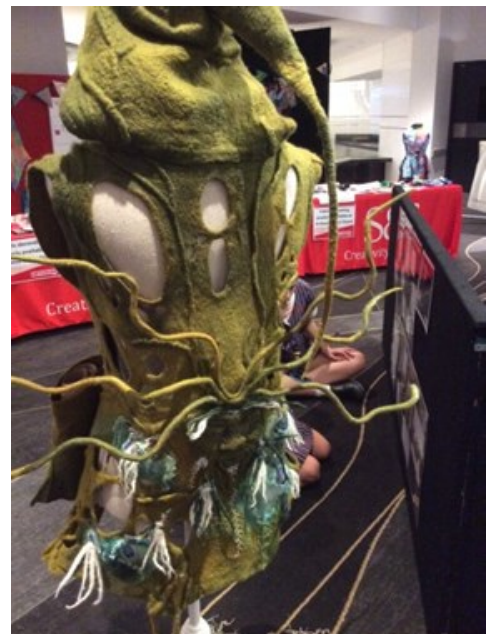


YEAR 11 & 12 TEXTILES AND DESIGN EXCURSION

NEWCASTLE VOLLEYBALL TOURNAMENT

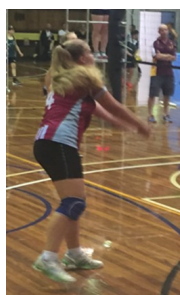

2016 AGE NATIONAL SWIMMING CHAMPIONSHIPS ADELAIDE



Two Pittwater High school students **Kai Van Kool** and **Jasen Winny** competed in the 2016 Age Swimming Championships in Adelaide from 26 March - 2 April. This was Kai's first year to qualify and Jasen's third with a finals placing in the 100m Butterfly in 2014 and a Silver Medal in 2015 in 14yrs Freestyle Relay Event.

Qualifying times are extremely difficult, with some events only having 25 qualifiers Australia-wide.

In the lead up to the event the boys attended early morning squads, a week long Nationals training camp in Port Macquarie during the January holidays, and were presented with their caps and uniform by Laurie Laurence.


This year had added interest as the event was just before the Olympic Trials which meant some of the younger Australian swim team were racing.

With a hectic schedule of morning heats and evening finals both were on deck to support their team each night forming part of a very loud cheer squad which added to the excitement.

There was some time to see Adelaide with Jasen taking part in an early morning 'Behind The Scenes' Zookeeper tour of Adelaide Zoo to visit the Giant Pandas Fu Ni and Wang Wang and learn about the zoo's breeding program.

Kai and Jasen have now qualified for the week long NSW State Age 13-18 year old Championships in Sydney from 12 - 18 December this year and have set their sights on the 2017 Age Swimming Nationals in Brisbane.

BOOK CLUB

After launching in the second half of 2015, Book Club has had a small and dedicated group of students who meet on Thursday A Lunch One. In term one we discussed two Australian novels, **The Book Thief** by Markus Zusak and **Johnno** by David Malouf.

Over the holidays the members were set a challenge: To read a book that they would never ordinarily pick up. This challenge was set with the intention of expanding their reading habits and broadening the novels that they would consider in the future. The students were inspired to pick up books based on the colours on the cover and on family recommendations (with some trepidation).

What we read and discussed:

The Orphan Master's Son – Adam Johnson

Emily: *The North Korean setting takes you into the history and context of another culture. The author went to North Korea to research his book and he exposes the denial of human rights in a touching and heartbreaking story.*

One Hundred Days of Happiness – Fausto Brizzi

Lucy: *A strange and at times confronting novel. It has an unlikeable protagonist who is attempting to tie up loose ends before his death. The motif of the doughnut represents the moments of happiness that occur in everyday life. Lucy is still on the fence about whether to recommend this to others.*

Indian Nocturne – Antonio Tabucchi

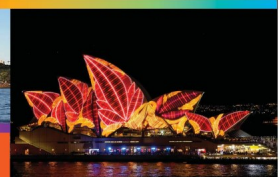

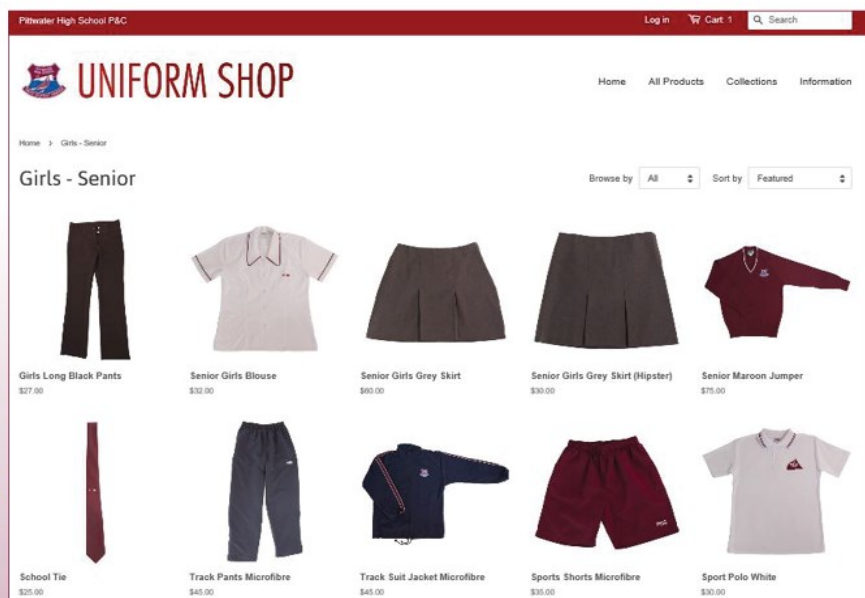
