Importance of Parents as Partners in Schooling

Jane Ferris. Principal's Report

In my years as an educator, I have observed a strong correlation between students' social and academic growth, and having parents who fully support and work closely with the school and teachers. Architecturally, triangle is a very strong shape, and in this context, the school/students/parents form the vertices of this structure. Your support may be as simple as keeping informed, through communication channels such as the newsletter, website, Facebook or emails from teachers. It also includes talking to your child about what they are doing at school each day. When you communicate a positive attitude to school and learning, your child is more likely be positive, connected, attend school everyday and do their best. In addition, it also means parents encouraging their child to accept responsibility for their actions on the occasions when they do get it wrong. It does not help a child's developing autonomy or resilience if parents step in too quickly with excuses for their child's uncompleted homework, not bothering with correct uniform or being rude to a teacher. That said, parents are of course encouraged to advocate for their child and communicate with us where there is an issue causing persistent concern. To use the homework example again, if you felt the homework was consistently too difficult for your child who might struggle with learning, or, over a period of time, regularly proving too easy for your child who might be very capable, then we would appreciate you letting us know.

This year has been more challenging for parents to feel connected to our school due to COVID-19 restrictions. Having said that, it was a joy last week to welcome parents at the delayed 2020/21 Prefect Induction. Also, it was great to have a P and C meeting on the premises to consider priorities in our School Improvement Plan process for implementation next year.

As a result of consulting with them, parents will have the opportunity to sign up to a Zoom meeting for input into one of the following priority areas:

- 1. Self-regulated homework linked to the new school day
- 2. Study skills to support self-regulation
- 3. Developing student engagement and resilience
- 4. Enhancing literacy skills
- 5. Challenging our high potential students

These options will be incorporated into a short survey being sent out in the next few days.

Finally, I would like say thank you to you the parents who do work so hard to support the school – whether giving positive feedback and suggestions, helping with canteen or uniform shop duty, responding promptly to communications from teachers, being on committees such as for the Instrumental and Vocal program and attending P and C meetings. The teaching staff truly appreciated the wide acknowledgement of their work that was apparent from the many messages we received on World Teachers' Day.



A special must go thank you to Mat Butterworth president of the P and C, and all of the wonderful P and C executive. Working with you all this year through the COVID pandemic, your support around the consultation process with the new school day structure for 2021 and your input into the School Plan have been fantastic and much appreciated.

We were delighted to welcome parents and family for the first time this year to celebrate this special occasion with us. I wish to acknowledge the efforts by the prefect co-ordinators, Ms Smalley and Ms Roulston for their organisation on the day.



High Expectations

We are in the last weeks of term, with exams for the junior school in some core subjects and we are very pleased to see students revising in class and using a number of techniques, guided by their teachers, to master content and attack possible exam questions. These examinations will provide all students with a challenge which will enable them to demonstrate their understanding of key concepts learnt throughout the year. We wish students all the best during these examinations.

The final weeks of the school year provide terrific learning opportunities and, in particular, the chance to build literacy and numeracy skills across all subject areas.

Our expectation is that students continue to

arrive to school on time every day, well prepared, with a charged device and a positive approach to their learning.

It is actually a requirement that students attend school every day and also present in full school uniform. If students are out of uniform, they must see their relevant DP in the morning with a signed letter from a parent in order to get a Uniform Pass. Far too many students are failing to do this and find themselves completing lunchtime detentions. If students then fail to attend these lunchtime detentions, an afterschool detention notice is issued. Also, on this topic, please remember that three late arrivals without a note will also result in an after-school detention on Tuesday.

Students must make sure to fill up water bottles in the breaks and to make sure they use the bathroom at lunchtime.

We would greatly appreciate it if there is an issue which is impacting on your child, for example mental health concerns, that you initially communicate with the Year Advisor who will confidentially pass on information to the member of the Wellbeing Team who will manage the issue. If the school is aware of any issues that are impacting your child outside the school environment, we are much better equipped to support and support your child moving forward.

Following the discussions earlier this term with Years 7-10, we are confident that all Pittwater students are now a more aware of what the Cabrananga classrooms look like, realise how we support students and recognise that the students receiving support in Cabrananaga have a timetable just like everyone else, have good days and bad days just everyone else and have skills and capabilities that make them unique just like everyone else.

We are so proud of our amazing Cabrananga students who helped lead the sessions and shared their stories which helped break down stereotypes and assumptions that people may have had about Cabrananga and students with special needs.

The responses from every class that attended the talks was wonderful and we believe was enjoyed by all who attended.





Year 9- Still Life Paintings- The Party

External Visitors to School Site form

For visitors to the school during school hours

Before external visitors are allowed on a school site, they must provide a signed copy of this form to the school principal. This form acts as evidence that the visitor is aware of, and will abide by their obligations to comply with the health advice of the day, including hygiene and distancing requirements. The visitor must provide personal contact information to the school to be used in an emergency or when performing contact tracing if required.

- Stay at home when unwell. Do not attend the school site if you are unwell.
- Practise good hygiene when on the school site.
- Wash your hands regularly and thoroughly.
 - Wash your hands or use hand sanitiser on arrival to the school and between providing support to students. Implement hand hygiene practices at regular intervals throughout your visit to the school.
- · Maintain respiratory hygiene.
 - Cover your cough or sneeze through coughing or sneezing into your elbow or tissue, and then
 disposing of tissues immediately. Always wash your hands after you have coughed, sneezed or
 blown your nose.
- Avoid shaking hands. Adopt non-contact greetings.
- Maintain physical distance.
 - Maintain physical distance from other people while on the school site. In particular, maintain a
 physical distance from adults at the school and limit physical contact with students.
- Implement cleaning protocol for shared items. (where relevant)
 - Any tools or equipment that will be used by staff or students must be cleaned before use.
 - Equipment that will be shared between groups of students should be cleaned between each use.
 - Equipment that cannot be cleaned should not be shared and must be disposed of between each use.
 - Equipment that is exposed to any bodily fluids must not be shared and must be cleaned and disinfected between each use.
- Use personal protective equipment (PPE) (where relevant)
 - If there is a risk of exposure to bodily fluids, suitable PPE must be worn while conducting the
 activity or task.
- Keep our school environment clean (where relevant)
 - Schools maintain a clean working and learning environment. Working and learning spaces should be left clean and tidy. Any high touch surfaces or work spaces areas should be wiped down following use with a suitable cleaning product.
- Operate in accordance with your COVID-19 Safety Plan (where relevant)
 - All businesses and organisations delivering services and programs within our schools must have a COVID-19 Safety Plan.

Acknowledgement from visitors on health and hygiene measures at our school:

Please note we would like to stay cashless although we are accepting cash. We request the cash the exact amount and is placed in a tub. This eliminates handling of the coins/notes by the canteen crew during the day. The tub is sterilised each afternoon by Samantha and kept separate from the main area. We are trying our best to keep the canteen a safe environment for all who work or visit.
