We have completed an in-depth situational analysis to inform our improvement journey across learning, teaching and leading. This process included the analysis of qualitative and quantitative data and engagement with research to develop a thorough understanding of where Pittwater High School is currently, and identify and prioritise the needs of students, staff and the school moving forward.

The school's Strategic Directions are:

- Student Growth and Attainment which includes our improvement strategy for our Higher School Certificate results and Literacy and Numeracy.
- Quality Teaching and Learning which focuses on strengthening collaborative practice to improve students learning and engagement.
- Student Engagement and Wellbeing to support the development of each student through the implementation and evaluation of school wellbeing processes to increase their connectedness, resilience and achievement.

Year 10 Subject Selection

All students in Year 10 will shortly select the courses they will study for their Higher School Certificate. This choice of courses is one of the most important decisions students make at school. This is also a time to reflect on the knowledge that Pittwater High School offers students, the opportunity to achieve excellent educational outcomes at an outstanding public school close to home and be taught by passionate, highly qualified, and caring teachers who know them well and how they learn.

Covid Advice

As reported last time, COVID-19 cases in the school community are on the rise. We request that students, staff and visitors only attend school when symptom free. We will continue to send students home who are displaying symptoms of COVID-19. We strongly recommend that anyone who believes they have been exposed to COVID-19 monitors for symptoms, test and wears a mask. Parents and carers who have children with persistent or ongoing symptoms of COVID-19 are encouraged to have these assessed by their local health care professional. These symptoms may be related to other illnesses that require treatment and management by a doctor. Should you require Rapid Antigen Tests, please ask your child to report to reception we they will be issued with them. Please report all positive COVID-19 cases to the school.

Attendance and Every Day Matters

Over the coming weeks all students in Years 7-10 will be reflecting on their current attendance pattern and setting goals to improve their attendance in Semester 2. A student who misses one day per fortnight is missing four weeks of school per year. This is four weeks of disruption to learning. A student who is late to school each day and misses 5 minutes of class is missing out on three days of learning over a year. When a student is genuinely unwell, we appreciate parents keeping them at home to avoid potentially making others unwell. What we ask is that every day your child can attend school, you encourage them to do so, and we thank all parents for supporting us in our endeavours to improve student attendance.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

Amendment to Pittwater High School Assessment Handbook June 2023 - A.I.

NESA and NSW Department of Education have strict rules and guidelines which we follow in regards to best practice for ensuring students are committed to producing work which is their own. In a time where AI is rapidly developing and there are numerous app's, platforms and programs available which students can use to produce work which is not their own.

This is called malpractice and or plagiarism. Malpractice is any attempt to gain an unfair advantage over other students. Plagiarism is when you pretend that you have written or created a piece of work that someone else originated. It is cheating, it is dishonest, and it could jeopardise your results.

Students from Years 7 to 12 must produce their own work. As fast as AI technology is developing, so too are programs to assist educators from Primary to Tertiary to determine when work has been generated by AI.

We have updated the **Pittwater High School Assessment Policy** to include malpractice using Al. To avoid plagiarism, students should:

- * Take careful notes when researching and reading and use your own words when summarising and paraphrasing information.
- Use proper citation styles, as guided by your teachers, to give credit to the original author of the work. If you are unsure about how to cite something, ask your teacher for help.
- * Avoid using AI tools to generate or summarise content, as these tools often produce content that is not original and can lead to plagiarism.

Regarding AI and assessment tasks:

- * The use of AI tools to generate or summarise content is strictly prohibited.
- * If a student is found to have used AI tools and presented this as their own work, the student may receive a zero for the task and may face additional consequences. In the case of HSC students, all schools are required to keep a register of malpractice. Malpractice is any attempt to gain an unfair advantage over other students.
- * The use of AI tools for citation and grammar checking is permitted, but students should not rely solely on these tools to check their work.

By following these guidelines and understanding the school's response to the use of AI, students can ensure that their work is their own, and they are producing quality, original work.

A note for parents: If you want to check if Al was used you can copy the document and paste into ChatAl and then ask 'did you write this'. Another way to identify if it is your child's work is Al phrasing and use of language does miss the emotional connection and creativity that a human response brings to thinking and understanding. If you have doubts, have a conversation with your child and ask specific questions in relation to their thinking behind their work. If they can't demonstrate knowledge of draft versions, chances are they have used Al technology.

At Pittwater we want our students set up for success each and every day. This will allow them the opportunity to learn, grow and achieve what they are capable of. Here are some simple tips to remind students on how to be prepared for learning.

- Check timetable the night before and pack the necessary equipment.
- * Charge device.
- * Wear correct uniform.
- Be punctual to class.
- * Keep phone off and away all day.
- * Carefully listen to the teacher in class.
- * Ask questions.
- * Try your best.

A small change in attitude and behaviour can make a big difference to a students success.






At Pittwater we are following the Department of Education's High Potential and Gifted Education Policy (HPGE).





UPDATED NSW School Vaccination Program 2023

Due to Year 7 Camp changes, the vaccination schedule for 2023 has been updated and the following vaccinations will be offered free of charge at school clinics this year:

Year 7 - dTpa (Diphtheria/Tetanus/Pertussis) - NEW DATE Friday 25th August (Wk 6, Term 3)

Year 10 - Meningococcal ACWY vaccine: Tuesday 15th August (Wk 5, Term 3)

Note: From February 2023, children in year 7 will now only need one dose of HPV vaccination.

This change has been endorsed by ATAGI based on evidence showing that one dose provides the same level of protection against HPV as two doses.

If you have already consented to your child receiving two doses of HPV vaccine, they will only receive one dose. If your Year 8 child previously missed their second dose of HPV vaccine, they are now considered fully vaccinated and do not require a second dose.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received

To provide consent for any vaccination online go to https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school, you will need:

- your ServiceNSW log-in details, or <u>create an account with ServiceNSW</u> if you don't already have one
- Medicare details for parents/carers and your child

Benefits of online consent for parents/carers:

- SMS notifications when vaccinations are given
- easy updating of your child's details online
- faster upload of your child's vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR)

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from our school.
