

Principal's Message

Commendation Assemblies 2023

Students, teachers, parents and carers celebrated learning on Monday 7 August and Friday 11 August for Years 7-9 and 10-12 respectively. Students who received an award did so because they had shown a commitment to learning and demonstrated learning dispositions.

This year we are focusing on not just delivering curriculum but embedding learning dispositions into lessons. Learning Dispositions are designed to support students to learn throughout school and set them up for learning and life beyond school. The list includes, but is not limited to, persistence, grit, resilience, self-regulation, curiosity, collaboration, creativity, initiative and systematic problem solving. Each Faculty chose three dispositions to focus on and these were listed on the student's award.

Prefects Elect 2023/2024

Congratulations to the 24 students who were successful in gaining the position of Prefect in the recent elections. Ms Gambino, Ms Silk, outgoing school captains Abigail Hamilton and Linus Wang interviewed the 11 prefects nominating for the positions of School Captain and Vice-Captain. These students will address the school in an assembly on Monday. It takes courage to nominate and I thank and congratulate all students who put themselves forward.

Wellbeing Programs

Pittwater High School is currently engaged in the Safeguarding Kids Together Program. Through this process we will be looking at our capacity to mitigate and manage risk across three domains. These domains are: *Building resilient and inclusive school communities, Identifying students vulnerable to high risk-taking behaviour and Supporting students vulnerable to high risk-taking behaviour and Supporting students, processes and practices across the domains and enhance safe learning and working environments.*

We will be reviewing our current wellbeing programs and practices focussed on Student Wellbeing, Staff Wellbeing, Attendance, Anti-bullying, Anti-racism, Cyber-safety and Community Engagement. One activity associated with Student Wellbeing is School Wellbeing Mapping which involves identifying and evaluating current school wellbeing programs according to the NSW Wellbeing Framework for Schools. *Continues over...*

On Tuesday 5 September, as part of the Safeguarding Kids Together program, we will be conducting Student Voice Focus Groups for students in Years 7-9, facilitated by the Safeguarding Kids Together program coordinators. Student Voice Focus Groups provide an opportunity for students to share their ideas and opinions about various aspects of school. Students will be chosen at random to participate and parent permission sought prior to the focus groups.

Mobile Phones

Until Term 4 2023, mobile phone use in school is at the discretion of the school. A new policy will take effect from **Day 1 Term 4** in all NSW Public Schools. **There will be no mobile phone use in school for all students in Years 7-12**. This includes all school organised events including camps, carnivals and excursions. It also covers canteen use. Students will need to ensure they have a card or use flexi-schools. More information about implementation of the policy at Pittwater High School will be sent to families shortly.

Congratulations to all the Year 12 students who have submitted or are about to submit Major Works. A huge effort by both students and teachers have gone into the completion of projects and we wish you all the best. As planned, through small group interviews, all students in Years 7-10 have recently had the opportunity to reflect upon and set goals for either maintenance or improvement of their attendance.


We want to do all we can to be sure your child achieves their potential and enjoys being in school. We know that school is the best place to learn. By attending school every day your child will get the most out of their learning and improve their career and life options. When your child is absent it is important you let the school know, including the reason why, on the day or the day before. This helps make sure we know where our students are and offer support for you and your family if needed.

If you are having difficulties getting your child to school every day or on time, please talk to our school staff so we can work together because every day counts.

Missing a day here or there may not seem like much, but absences add up and can negatively impact your child's learning and wellbeing. When your child misses one day a week that's 40 days of school and 8 weeks of learning in one year. Over an entire school journey this adds up to 2.5 years of lost learning.

YEAR 7 ENCLISH

During Term 2 Year 7 English undertook a novel study, where they deeply considered the overarching question for the unit: How do novels encourage us to learn about ourselves and the world? Through this study, students discovered that we learn about human experiences more deeply from engaging with literature. They also learned to express their understanding by developing analytical paragraphs, where they integrated well-chosen evidence from their prescribed novels to build their responses.

Here is an example of an Introduction, and two Body Paragraphs crafted by Jasmine Baak, Year 7

Authors have the power to utilise words and characters and expose us to unknown or meaningful ideas, inspiring our desire to understand human experiences and the world around us. Salman Rushdie, a prestigious Indian-born British-American novelist, guides responders through a magic realism tale, provoking the vast understanding of life experiences in his novel 'Haroun and the Sea of Stories'. Rushdie explores the ideas of discovery and hope which are essential components of understanding the complexity of human experiences in a more impactful way and strengthening responders' imagination.

Discovery has the power to fuel a sense of understanding inside individuals and through that, form cherished relationships. Rushdie stimulates discovery through our own imagination and allows us to explore a world beyond our own through the characterisation of Haroun. Rushdie's ability to captivate the responders and help us grow an understanding of the imaginative side of discovery is revealed through Haroun when he thinks, "He knew what he knew: that the real world was full of magic, so magical worlds could easily be real." The use of a declarative statement emphasises the new understanding and importance of finding discovery in one's own world through the magic of imagination. Furthermore, Rushdie highlights the importance of discovery in relationships and perspectives when Haroun explains to the Hoopoe, "Understand,' he said to the Hoopoe, 'it's really good to know you'll be here when I need you. But the way things are just now, I honestly don't need to go anywhere at all. "Rushdie's use of emotive language and tone reveals insight into Haroun's character, demonstrating that his progressive discovery of the Hoopoe can lead to a more intimate friendship and deeper understanding of relationships. Therefore, the discovery of an individual has the power to build imagination and form great friendships as Rushdie encourages the readers to explore themself and find understanding in one's worlds.

Hope is what influences us to persist through challenges and overcome our greatest struggles in life whilst expanding our desire of resilience and trust. Rushdie demonstrates ambition to achieve something we truly value through the depiction of Haroun's character. Rushdie exemplifies hope through Haroun's desire of happiness for his city when he expresses, "You said it could be a big wish, and so it is. I come from a sad city, a city so sad that it has forgotten its name. I want you to provide a happy ending, not just for my adventure, but for the whole sad city as well." The use of emotive language and the repetition of the word 'sad' accumulates Haroun's longing to turn his sad city into something remarkable and emphasises the resilience he shows in the uplifting of his home. Similarly, Rushdie demonstrates Haroun's passion and yearning for his wish, whilst showing his trust in the Hoopoe, "Haroun lay stretched out on the back of Butt the Hoopoe, oblivious of time, oblivious of everything except his wish." The use of repetition of the word 'oblivious' highlights what is truly important to Haroun and focalises his intense desperation in relation to his wish for his city. From this, we recognise that the challenges we overcome can lead to hope and trust in what we value. Therefore advancing the thought, hope is what influences us to persist through challenges and strive for what truly matters to us, emphasising the importance of resilience and trust.

ADVANCED ENGLISH

Year 11 Advanced English class got into the spirit of Shakespeare, preparing an analysis of <u>Othello</u> to act out for the class. Persistence, curiosity and creativity were all demonstrated in the way they enthusiastically pulled apart the text and linked it to the tragic hero narrative structure. 

Supporting your young person preparing to finish school



Life is full of transitions where we move from one stage to another. Finishing school can involve multiple transitions with entry to TAFE, university, or getting work leading to moving away from home, changes to support networks and becoming financially independent.

Change can be challenging, and everyone responds differently. It's good to know that we are hard-wired to cope with change and that the anxiety we feel is universal and helps us rise to deal with challenges. We can support our young people to approach challenges from the mindset of learning new skills to cope and get support from others.

This tip sheet is to link you with some resources that you might find helpful as you support your young person to prepare to leave school.

How to support your young person

1. Initiate a conversation

Initiate conversations to check in with how they are feeling about school ending.

2. Acknowledge feelings

Acknowledge their feelings and normalize them. Explain that change is challenging and it's normal to feel a range of emotions including stressed, excited, overwhelmed, and relieved. Reassure them that you are here to help as are members of the school community.

3. Communicate it's OK

Communicate that it's ok if they don't know what they want to do. It's ok if they decide on something now and then changes their mind or don't get into a particular course or job. Reassure them that there are other options and that you'll support them with their next steps.



4. Look out for signs

Look out for signs that they might be struggling with their mental health – the most reliable indicator is changes in behaviour. This might be:

- Changes in mood or personality, including persistent irritability, sadness, anger or worry
- Low self-esteem or having a poor view of themselves and their future
- · Increased levels of anxiety, stress and distress
- · Less interest or pleasure in things they usually enjoy
- Changes in appetite and weight, including weight loss or gain
- Appearing sleepy or reporting not getting enough sleep or sleeping too much
- A drop in performance at school or work, including difficulties with concentration
- Withdrawing from others, not going out as much, or not going to school or work
- Trouble connecting with others of their own age
- Looking unkempt for example, poor hygiene or wearing dirty clothes
- Reporting unusual or distressing thoughts that are impacting on their life
- Any physical signs of harm, either by themselves or others, including cuts and bruises
- Expressing feelings of hopelessness, or even expressing that life isn't worth living
- Involving themselves in, or an increase in risky behaviours, like using alcohol or other drugs



What to do if you notice a change in your young person

If you notice a change in your young person's mood or behaviour that lasts for more than a few weeks, is distressing them or affects their ability to get on with everyday activities and enjoy life this could be a sign they are struggling.

The earlier we can notice the signs that a young person may be struggling, the sooner we can help.

Young people: Mental health and wellbeing support

At school, contact the year advisor, school counselling service or student support officer to let them know they are struggling and to explore what additional support is available.

Your GP is often a good starting point when someone in your family is struggling with their mental health and needs help. They can help sort out what is happening and options for treatment and support.

It will help you to determine what level of support and help they need.

Paving Ways - Parent Support Information

Drug dependence affects a family, not just a person. Paving Ways is a psychoeducational therapeutic group for parents and carers who are experiencing the effects of their young person's problematic substance use. Paving Ways is a **6-week program** run by **qualified counsellors** who understand the complexities of **problematic alcohol and/or drug use** and associated **mental health** issues.

Paving Ways is designed to provide information to help parents/carers gain a deeper understanding of what is occurring within their family. It is common for parents/carers who contact SDECC to be anxious, fearful, and overwhelmed. Paving Ways helps parents/carers to reduce feelings of isolation through doing the group with other parents/carers who are having similar experiences.

What to expect

To ensure a safe and supportive environment, the group is a closed group, with a maximum of 9 participants. Confidentiality of all group members is protected and must be agreed upon by the group prior to commencement.

It is important for participants to attend every week. This is because the program is developed so that each topic builds on the previous week. This ensures that you have the knowledge and confidence to successfully utilise the skills and strategies within your family.

What is the cost?

All services are free and confidential. No Medicare card is needed.

Eligibility: The Paving Ways program is for parents/carers of a young person, who is between the ages of 12-25, and currently using drugs and/or alcohol. The young person must live or work or study in the North Shore, Northern Beaches or Ryde area. The young person does not have to be a current client at SDECC for the parents to access support.

Getting in touch: SDECC is a self-referral service for parents/carers. If you are a parent/ carer and are concerned about your young person's substance use and co-occurring mental health issues, please give us a call on 9977 0711.
