#### **Local Contractor Information Session**

School Infrastructure NSW manages a large maintenance program for schools across NSW. To do this work, they are looking to engage local businesses, including Aboriginal owned businesses and people. #### Resilience in Our Teens (RIOT)

During Terms 2 and 3 all staff at Pittwater High School will engage in a project - Resilience in Our Teens (RIOT), a whole school approach to manage anxiety.

RIOT is a large-scale evidence-based project designed to assist students to manage their anxious behaviour. It is delivered through a series of cognitive-behavioural lesson plans and through the use of teacher-led conversational techniques. These interventions are aimed at helping a teenager to manage their anxiety. There will be opportunities for parents to engage in the program through webinars with psychologists.

#### **Communication Strategy**

We are continually working to improve our communication of key events. Please follow us on Facebook and Instagram for all updates, including the new Monday weekly update from our student leaders.

Parents frequently need to contact the school and we try to manage your queries or feedback as efficiently as possible. #### 2024 Sydney North Swimming Championships

Pittwater High was well represented at the Sydney North Swimming Championships, Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre with 25 strong swimmers attending the event on 20 March. This is the highest number of swimmers we have had in a long time to make it through to this level, which shows the calibre and depth of talent that our students exhibit.

We had seven relay teams make it through from Zone, with three of these teams successfully making it through to the NSWCHS (Combined High Schools) Championships.


We also celebrated a number of top individual results including:



#### Become, Discover, Be Challenged

#### Winter Camp - Overview

The motto of **Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment** (RYPEN), which emerged from the first seminar in 1980, is "the Cultivation of Youth" and after comprehensive review, we define that we do this through supporting participants to **Become**, **Discover and Be Challenged**. RYPEN aims for the average student and not for the outstanding few, if your young person has qualities worth developing, qualities of decency, courage, persistence, sincerity, and application in everyday life, and deserve a further development opportunity then they are suitable for RYPEN. They do not have to be the leaders in the school or up at the top of their year, they simply must show qualities that would be worth further development and nurturing.

RYPEN is aimed at the young people aged between 14 and 16 year; must be minimum 14 at the start of the camp and in years 8 to 10 at school. The aim of camp is to challenge participants to become and discover through a series of sessions on goal setting, problems solving and social experiences which will assist them in forming their own values and moral standards, and to broaden their horizons culturally, socially, and academically. Participants will be given an opportunity to learn from achievers in the worlds of business, law enforcement and more. Presenters will speak at workshops and share their experiences with participants, while emphasizing the need to dream big, work hard and stay focused. At the same time, participants are interacting with peers from different backgrounds and improving their leadership, teamwork, and communication skills. All this is done in an informal atmosphere, where questions and debates are facilitated and encouraged. In addition to camp activities, participants receive suitable instruction and play an active part in introducing and thanking guest speakers, leading group activities, and assisting in camp chores.

The cost is only \$350.00 per student but this will be funded by a local Rotary club seeing no cost to schools or families. Our rules are simple and are consistent with civilised behaviour; breaches may result in the student being sent home. We accept participants from a diversity of backgrounds, genders and schools.

If the participant cancels within the 7 days prior to camp, without an unavoidable reason the family may be liable for the cost and no refunds will be given if participants are sent home for a breach of rules.

It is advised that the participants do not go with friends. If the participants do not know anyone at the start of the seminar, they will leave with 60+ new friends when it finishes on Sunday afternoon, it allows them to leave behind perceived personas and pushes them out of their comfort zone in a safe environment, where the most growth can occur.

Participants are accommodated in dormitory style rooms for up to eight people and meals are provided in a communal dining room. Special dietary requirements can be catered for by the camp chefs. The District RYPEN committee provides the organisation and planning; Rotarians, their Partners and Youth Facilitators (Mentors) live-in for the duration of the camp, as counsellors and mentors and we also have a camp Nan and Pop just in case.
