For the first time in Pittwater High School history, our Under 15s Netball Team competed in the NSW Combined High School State Knockout Championships in Wollongong.

The girls showed some fierce determination to produce two great wins on Day 1 of the competition. On Day 2, the girls had some nail-biting losses, and another two fantastic wins.

The team faced some quality competition against the Sports High Schools and were able to walk off the court with immense pride. The team finished 11th in the State, and we are so proud of their efforts. Thank you to Ms Millson and Ms Gundry and the parent support crew who accompanied the team on the two days.

Congratulations also to Tahlia P (Year 10) who represented Sydney North in the Open Women's Water Polo team in the Combined High School's championships. The Sydney North team won, and Tahlia has now been selected to play in the NSW Combined High School Sports Association 17 years team.

Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiads (APSMO)

This year, ninety students from Years 7 and 8 competed in three APSMO Maths Games. Two students Brooke H and Samuel R achieved a score in the top 10%. Charles G, Abbie P, Genevieve T, Evan B, Chloe T and Sarah N achieved results in the top 25%. One Year 8 team placed in the top 40% of all the teams that competed across Australia and New Zealand and Mitchell B, Lachlan E, Charlotte C, Sasha K, Jasmine B, Bailey S and Tim S received Encouragement Awards. Congratulations to all students who participated and thank you to Ms Goodwin, Ms Paterson, Ms Rous and Ms McClean for their facilitation of the competition.

Year 9 Explosive History

At the end of Term 3 Miss Sonter and Miss Jones' Year 9 Explosive History class studied a unit on Reconstructing Ancient History which looked at how significant ancient historical sites have changed over time. The unit focused on how the purpose of sites has changed or continued and challenged students to consider the complex question of 'who owns history'. To demonstrate their understanding of these concepts students selected an ancient site of their choice to investigate further. Their assessment task asked them to reconstruct the site in its original form for the purpose of a museum display. Students had to incorporate interactive engagement strategies to capture audience attention in their exhibit. Students chose an amazing array of display methods ranging from physical to digital, including Minecraft and 3D printing.

Topics varied from the Parthenon in Athens, to Stonehenge in England and all the way to Petra in Jordan. Students went to amazing lengths and demonstrated significant skills of creative and critical thinking to bring their reconstructions to life.

For the first time at PHS there was a cross-curricula submission with the TAS Faculty's New Horizons Project where Elizabeth Murphy designed and created a 3D printed Pyramid of Giza as well as a fly-through video to support her reconstruction. It was great to see such innovative and creative ideas being applied to History as well as Accelerated Multimedia.

Students then converged upon the Learning Centre to display their exhibits to the school. We had many student and teacher visitors check out the exhibit and encourage and compliment their students on their efforts. Museum goers voted on their favourite reconstructions, with Cara Crawford's meticulously recreated Parthenon and Elizabeth Murphy's 3D printed Pyramid of Giza receiving the most votes. Congratulations!

This was a very enjoyable project for the students and teachers involved, and sharing it with the school was a great way to make learning visible and meaningful.

Thanks so all Year 9 Explosive students for making this such a successful event.


Year 9 History

This week in History, Year 9 have been learning about the nature of warfare and tactics of WWI. Students began this by looking at the conditions experienced by Australian soldiers in the trenches of Gallipoli and the Western Front, as well as the structure and function of a typical trench. Students then consolidated their knowledge of the role of generals, machine gunners and artillerists as well as firing trenches and No-Mans-Land through a trench warfare simulation. Students cycled through the various roles and took positions in both attack and defence to understand the order of operations within a trench warfare scenario. Students used paper 'ammunition' to simulate the rapid exchange of fire to capture the enemy flag. And whilst the students had a great time getting into this activity, it also demonstrated the chaotic and often futile nature of trench warfare. No students were able to capture the flag without being hit, highlighting the brutal stalemate on the Western Front.


Anytime History can be brought to life in this way is highly beneficial for students who can actively participate in the events of the past.

Year 9 International Studies



2023 is the first year that International Studies has been run as an elective for Year 9. The course introduces students to the concepts of cross-cultural communication, analysis of cultural differences and similarities, as well as encouraging students to challenge cultural stereotypes and advocate for the inclusivity of diverse cultures within Australia.

The course also introduces students to the topics of religion, politics, human rights and how these are often misrepresented in the media. Students also engaged significantly with the issue on the Voice to Parliament as a contemporary cultural issue. These topics enable students to consider current events in a global context to become active and informed citizens.

This infographic was created by Alyssa Smee and Rosie Harris who researched key aspects of Thai culture, investigating the different methods of cultural communication and celebration and how they represent important Thai social values and beliefs.

The students will begin their final topic on Culture and Travel which explores the benefits of travel on broadening the mind and enriching cultural experiences. Students will explore case studies on Dubai and another country of their own choice to examine the impact of tourism on these countries and how perceptions of countries are formed by cultural contexts.

International Studies is a great subject for anyone interested in humanities but want to study something vastly different from the mandatory History and Geography courses of Year 9. The topics on contemporary culture, culture and beliefs and culture and the media offer students the experience of thinking about the world in a global context and offer them an understanding of how the world is connected through culture.




RYDA - Road Safety Education Excursion

The carnival wasn't put together overnight, it involved an initial planning day in Term 2 with ice breaker activities at Pittwater HS, followed by a programming day trialling the activities at the newly renovated Mona Vale PS early in Term 3 and finally the carnival day that was delivered in late Term 3.

The carnival, hosted on our Pittwater High School grounds, saw over 400 students and parents in attendance. A day of beautiful weather allowed the students to participate in a modified Athletics Carnival, including running and sack races, parachute and target games and many more. 


DRAMA NEWS

School Student Travel

Term 4 2023

2024 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a new or replacement School Opal card or travel pass for 2024 can <u>apply</u> now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement because of a new shared parental arrangement (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, have repeated a year or received an expiry notification for their school travel entitlement should <u>renew or update</u> their details <u>before</u> the end of term 4. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications, and travel passes remain valid for the start of the 2024 school year. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade (i.e. grade two to grade three), the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new eligibility criteria, we will send an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

Term Bus Pass holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2024.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note**: some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

Changes to your bus service provider

Within Greater Sydney, a number of bus service providers have changed their names.

Parents intending to lodge an application for a School Opal card will need to visit <u>transportnsw.info</u> <u>trip planner</u> to obtain the correct bus operator name servicing your area prior to lodging an application.

Travel from Term 12024

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for 2024 School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel open at the start of Term 4 2023, so parents/students can <u>apply</u> or <u>update</u> details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a busy period for local transport operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their <u>local</u> bus operator to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Students using School Opal cards are also reminded that they must tap on and tap off in line with the Student code of conduct and Opal terms of use.




